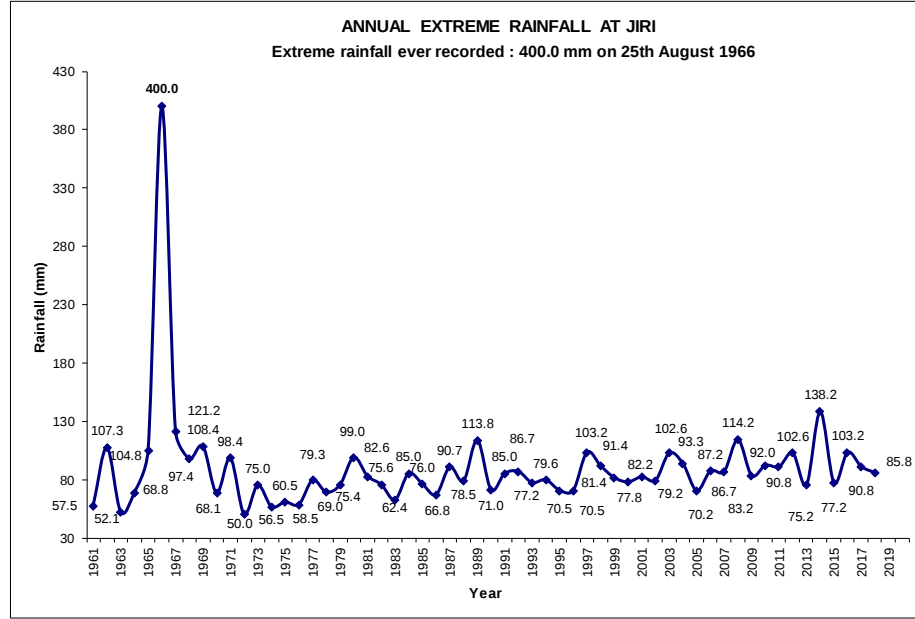
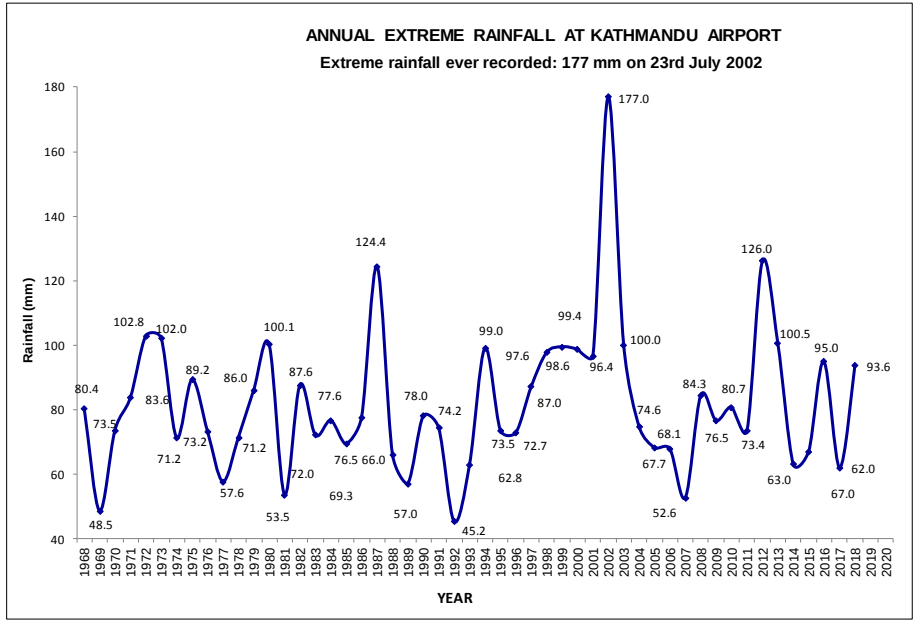
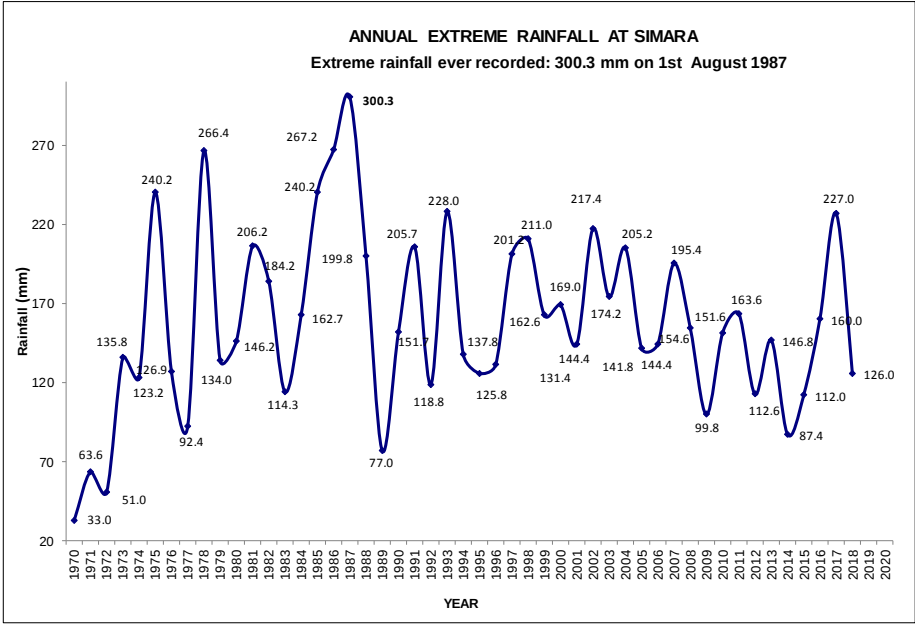
Note: The Precipitation extremes are usually recorded in Nepal during the monsoon months (June-September) especially in the month of July & August and only in some cases the extremes are recorded in the other months. The stations selected in this monitoring shows the annual extreme rain recorded in the station at Surkhet in the Far-western region of Nepal of 423.1mm on 15th August 2014. The rising, falling and the no trends are observed in 8, 7 and 5 stations respectively (Table 1).

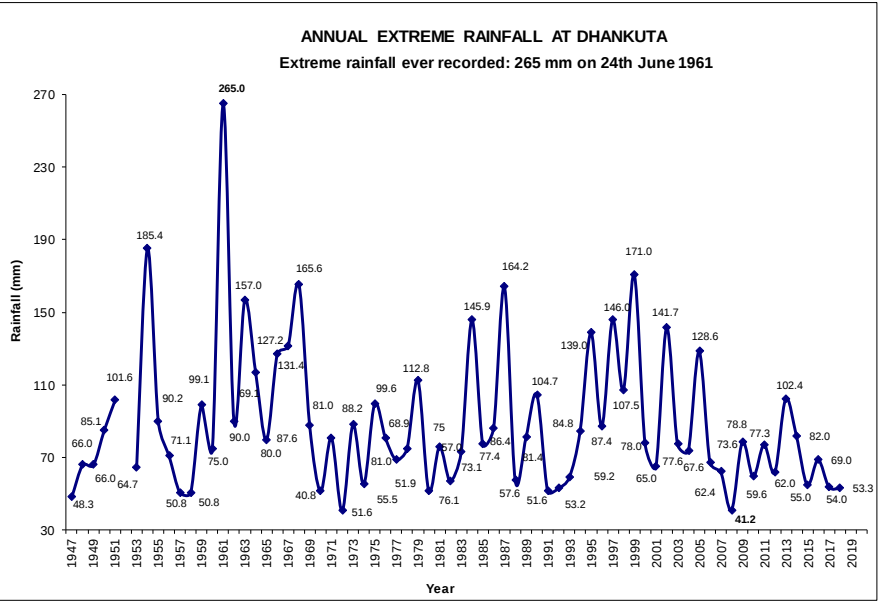
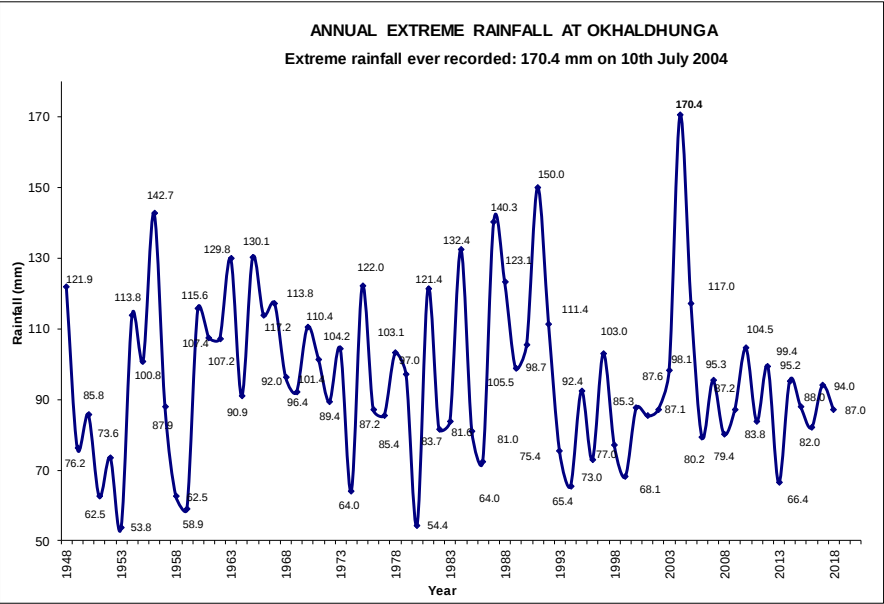
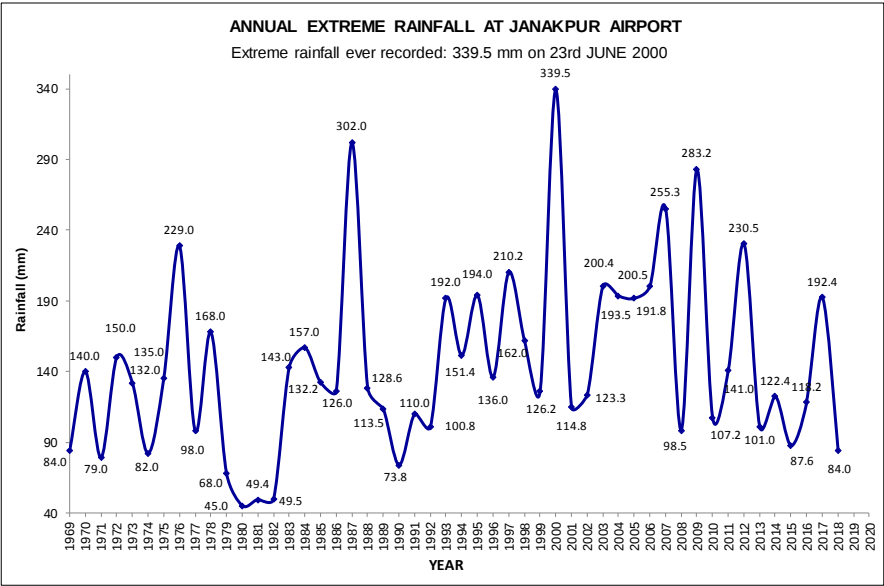












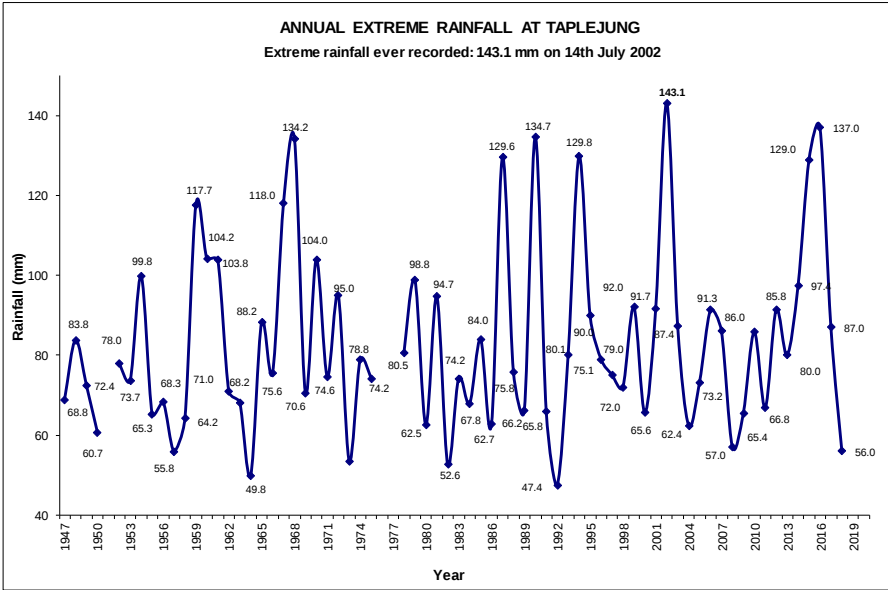
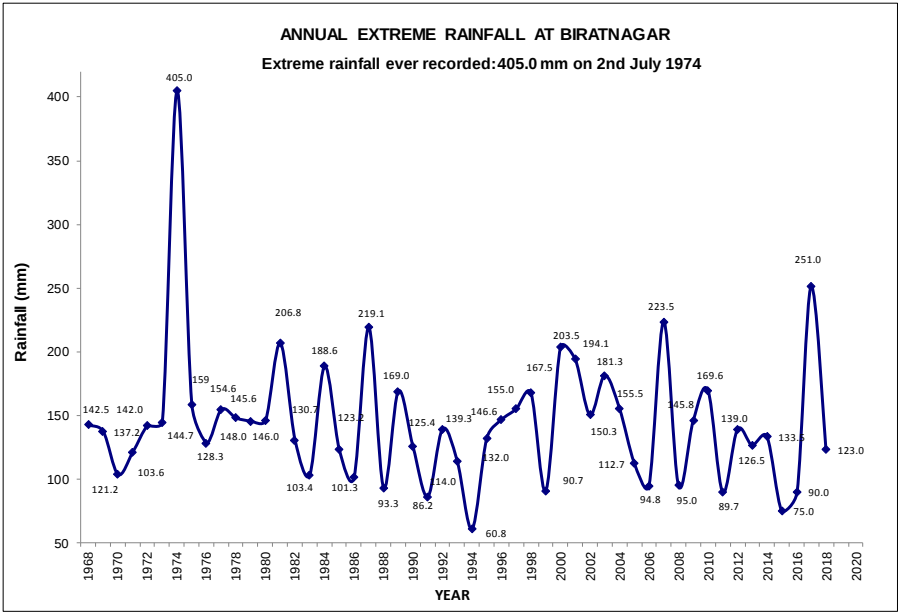
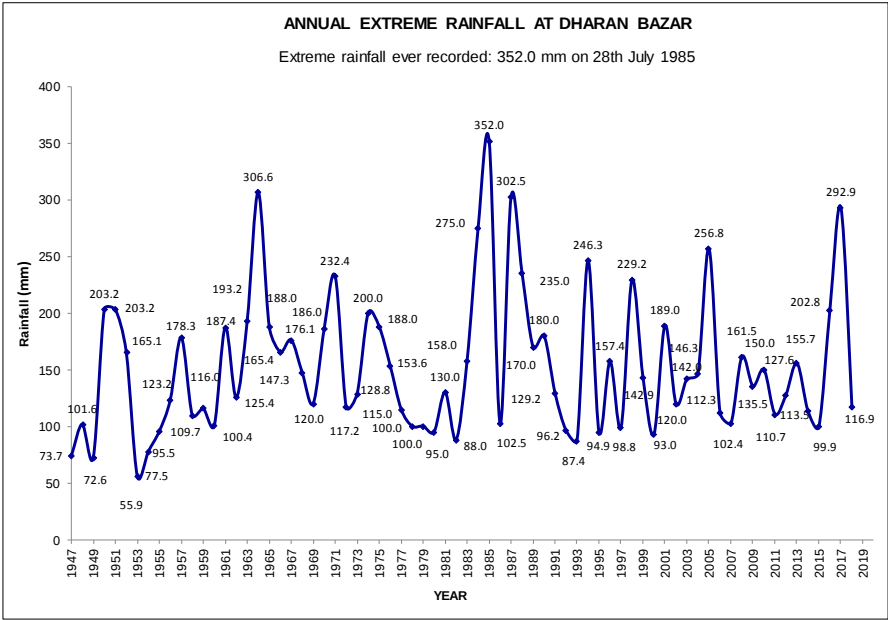
